Requirements to register:

- Must be 18 years old by the time of the next General Election
- Must be a U.S. citizen & able to document by providing one of the following numbers:
 - AZ driver license or non-operating ID, or Naturalization Number, or
 - Bureau of Indian Affairs Number, Indian Census number, Tribal Treaty Card Number, or
 - Tribal Enrollment Number, or
- a copy of one of the following:
 - Birth Certificate, or
 - Applicable pages of a United States Passport
- Must be a resident of Arizona & county on registration form

You cannot register if:

Convicted of more than 1 felony and have not had civil rights restored. If it is the first conviction, the individual may re-register once all probationary requirements are met. Rights are not automatically restored if it is the second felony conviction or more (the court must be petitioned).

Adjudicated incompetent.

Voter Registration Information



You must update your registration if:

- Move or change Post Office box
- Name change
- Political Party affiliation change
- Your signature changes

Once you are registered you do not need to provide citizenship documentation to update your registration; it is only necessary the first time you register in a county. If you move within the county, just re-register. If you move to another county you need to provide the documentation again.

Why do I have to register where I live?

Elected officials represent voters living in their district. For example, if you live in Yuma but are registered in Sells you are legally not eligible to vote back in Sells. You would need to register in Yuma and vote there locally. {The same holds true with tribal elections and county/state/federal elections. Voters need to register where they live rather than where they are from.}

I don't have a street address, what do I do?

The voter registration form has an area on the lower, right side to draw a map of where you live. In the address field enter in the community where you live (Salt River, White Mountain, etc.) Provide as much information as you can so that you can be placed in the correct precinct (outside of White Cone, off of 9001, 3 miles past 9061 junction).


What are the Political Parties in Arizona?

Currently the four recognized parties in Arizona are Democratic, Green, Libertarian and Republican.

Do I have to register to a Political Party?

You do not have to select a political party preference. You may choose which party's ballot you want to vote in the Primary Election if you did not select a party on your registration form or selected a party other than one of the recognized parties. Check with your county for any other locally recognized parties.

In order to vote in the Presidential Preference Election in 2016, you will have to be registered to a political party having an election. Unlike in our Primary, you will not be able to declare a party at the polls on Election Day for the preference election.



When can I register?

The registration deadline is **29 days before each election**. You may register at anytime, but if it is after the 29th day, you are not eligible to vote in that election.

Where do I go to register?

- Local County Recorder/Elections office
- Department of Motor Vehicles
- Post Office
- Service Arizona (www.servicearizona.com)
- Call your local Elections office and they can mail you a form
- Tribal Offices

Why should I register?

Who are you voting for if you don't vote? Elected officials determine policy and funding for schools, parks, law enforcement, military, social services, and roads. You will have the ability to sign nomination and initiative petitions (i.e. gaming issue) which determines what is on the ballot. You have the ability to elect local representation. If you don't vote, not only are you not voting FOR anyone, you're also not voting AGAINST a candidate you may not like.



When are the 2016 elections?

March 8, 2016	Jurisdictional Elections <i>(City/Town, schools, etc.)</i>
March 22, 2016	Presidential Preference Election <i>(Democratic, Green and Republican Parties)</i>
May 17, 2016	Special Statewide Election <i>(Some counties may also have Jurisdictional Elections)</i>
August 30, 2016	Primary Election
November 8, 2016	General Election
